in 1971 resulting in 189 deaths and 16,000 injuries. The estimated cost of these accidents, based on a National Safety Council formula, was about \$169 million.

"Tailgating" is the most common driver violation, outstripping even speed and alcohol as causal factors in crashes in Oakland County, states TIA Managing Director Bruce B. Madsen.

Using computerized data, TIA determines the time, location, severity of accidents, and driver violations involved for individual communities within the county.



County-wide, most accidents occur between 3 and 4 p.m. Friday is the worst day of the week, and January the worse month of the year for accidents. Oakland County's "10 most hazardous intersections," rated by TIA, are (in order): Woodward at 13 Mile, Royal Oak; Greenfield at 10 Mile, Southfield; Southfield at 12 Mile, Royal Oak; Woodward at Square Lake Rd., Bloomfield Twp.; Telegraph at Elizabeth Lake, Pontiac; Orchard Lake at 12 Mile, Farmington Twp.; Pretty at Montclair and Northeast Blvd. in Pontiac; and Woodward at 10 Mile in Royal Oak.
