

Field House Studied Budget Hearing Set By C'ville

The Clarenceville Board of Education will conduct a public hearing on its proposed \$3,992 million budget Thursday, Nov. 9, at 8 p.m. The budget is \$28,450 over

anticipated income of \$3,992 million, but Supt. David McDowell said the difference can be met from an \$85,000 surplus left from last year. The agenda also calls for

consideration of architectural fees for a proposed field house at the athletic field adjacent to the junior high school and study of the plans themselves.

THE PROPOSED field

house, to cost an estimated \$150,000, would include locker and shower facilities for athletes and a storage area. Other items scheduled for attention include study of the need for retrofitting a portion of Edgewood School and replacement of junior high band audio equipment burglarized last May.

The meeting will feature an 8:30 p.m. presentation of a portrait of Arthur G. Mann, former longtime principal of Clarenceville Junior High School and now principal of Westbrook Elementary School.

The board commissioned Laurel B. Raisanen to paint the portrait in pastels.

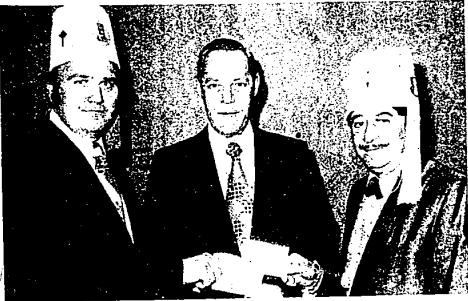
Young Goes 2 From C'ville To Conference At Conference
