

# Rev. Brickner Will Speak At Trinity

Trinity Baptist Church of Livonia will present a demonstration of the Jewish Passover meal by the Rev. Albert Brickner at 8 p.m., Sunday, Nov. 12. The church is located at 14800 Middle Belt. The meal is the traditional way in which Jews celebrate their coming out of Egypt. Christians have found the demonstration helpful in putting commemoration of the Lord's Supper in historical perspective.

Rev. Brickner is general director of Israel's Remnant, Inc., a society which presents the message of Christianity to the Jewish people and seeks to help Christians understand Jewish customs.

Rev. Brickner was born into a Jewish Orthodox family in Mobile, Ala. His family moved to Detroit when he was a boy. He attended Wayne State University, Gordon School, Gordon Divinity School and

Boston University graduate school. He served with Israel's Remnant in Boston for 13 years. He now lives in Farmington with his wife and three children.

The Wall Street Journal's recent report of an estimated 40,000 clergy who are preaching \$1 million worth of sermons purchased from a dozen firms is about as morally edifying as the purchase of term papers from similar firms by lazy and dishonest college students.

Among proprietors of this homiletic prostitution, the use of an occasional Lawrence Brett of Baltimore, as well as former sportscaster Red Barber, an Episcopal layman who explains piously: "God is the greatest manager of us all."

Yet the Journal quotes the Rev. Charles Hund of St. Bartholomew's Catholic Church in Chicago as making the following admission: "Frankly, I don't have the time or the training to produce a quality sermon each week. I don't think I'm shortchanging my congregation if I find something suitable from an outside source."

Initiation may be the sincerest form of flattery, but rarely can the pulpit plagiarist approximate even the most modest efforts of a genuine preacher.
