## Student Attends Congress Seminar

FARMINGTON Claireann Schwer, 35761 Johnston Rd., Farmington, a student at Farmington High, has been chosen to take part in a 1973 Congressional seminar at Washington, D.C.

Seven one-week seminars will be held in cooperation with Mt. Vernon College in Washington, where the students are housed and attend daily activities.

EACH AFTERNOON they travel to Congress where they participate in special dialog discussions, under a new conference format, with members of Congress, Supreme Court Justices and Cabinet officials. They also attend committee hearings as well as House and Senate sessions.

Special events, such as embassy receptions and federal agency policy briefings are scheduled each evening. A final dance and buffet rounds out the week.

A highlight of each seminar is a student-run "sense of the seminar" plenary session. At this meeting, 10 resolutions on national priority are prepared and presented by the students for consideration.

Debate follows the rules of the U.S. House of Representatives and an Officer of the House presides. Final resolutions are presented to the leadership of Congress.

The seminars are conducted by the Washington Workshops Foundation, a nonprofit, nonpartisan association of educational leaders founded in 1967 to offer a series of unique study seminars in American government to high school students from across the United States.

Students are selected on the basis of their own interest in American government and the United States Congress and on recommendation of their high school government teachers and guidance counselors.
