Five young musicians from Farmington will break a long standing precedent when they perform for Detroit's Tuesday Musicales Feb. 6 in the Detroit Institute of Arts auditorium.

The quintet, all members of the Glockenspiels, youth group of the Farmington Musicales, has been invited to play a woodwind suite for the group which has a long-standing tradition of using only its own members for its monthly programs.

THEY WILL give the premiere performance of "City-Scape," a five-part work composed by Charlene Slabey of Northville. During

Mrs. Slabey, a Farmington Musicales member, is advisor to the Glockenspiels.

The quintet consists of Ann Osterdale, flute; Sandy Williams, oboe; Laura Marshall, French horn; Fran Hughes, bassoon and Cindy Niemczak, clarinet. Ann and Sandy attend Harrison High

School, Laura and Cindy Farmington High, and Fran North Farmington.

FERN BARBER, Farmington school district instrumental music teacher, is directing the ensemble.

The unusual visit to the Tuesday Musicales came about because Mrs. Slabey, a member of the group, had been in charge of its February program.

Illness last fall forced her to turn arrangements over to fellow members Viola Nelson and Alma Exley, both of Detroit. They decided they would like the program to include Mrs. Slabey's suite.

That led to the decision to break tradition and invite the Glockenspiel quintet to perform. For the occasion, Crowleys in Farmington donated matching purple plaid outfits to the girls.

The five movements in the tone picture are Dawn, Morning, Afternoon, Evening and Midnight. The Tuesday Musicales meeting is scheduled at 10:30 a.m.

When not on tour, Doktor teaches in New York at Mannes College, New York University and the Juilliard School of Music and the Philadelphia Musical Academy.

HE HAS been hailed for bringing a "vibrant musical experience to a world of concert audiences unfamiliar with the 'Cinderella' of the string family."

His concert tour this year will take him to Mexico City. Last February, as part of the celebrations of William Walton's 70th birthday, he was soloist in Walton's Viola Concerto with the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic in a series of broadcasts and on a national broadcast.

His playing has inspired several additions to the viola literature.
