

GC West 2nd Best This Season

The Tri-River basketball team will be going down to the east Friday night in the regular season, but for Coach Jerry Babler and his Garden City West crew, their race for the crown ended when Taylor Kennedy beat Cherry Hill, 82-61.

"We are dead in the league race," said Babler even though his Tigers upended Riverside, 78-67. "Cherry Hill did to beat Kennedy for us to remain in contention."

As it is now, the best West team is in for the second. Kennedy and Schaefer are in a battle Friday for the Tri-River crown, each sporting

112 marks. West is next best at 103.

Babler had one hope remaining for at least tie for the title. If Cherry Hill beat Kennedy and Kennedy beat Schaefer, they would sport 113 marks, the record Babler said all along would win the league.

And West could tie both of them with wins over Riverside and Cherry Hill.
