Curfew Ordinance.

An ordinance to be styled "Curfew Ordinance" of the village of Farmington, Mich., to provide for keeping boys and girls, unless they are accompanied by their parents, from idly roaming the streets of said village.

SEC. 1—1t shall be ulawful for child. ren, boys or girls under the age of 16 years, to idly roam in the streets of the village of Farmington unless accompanied by one of their parents, after 8:30 p. m. from April 1st to Oct. 1st, and 8:00 p. m. from Oct. 1st to April 1st, during 1914 and each year thereafter.

SEC. 2—It shall be the duty of the
marshal, president of the village or any
alderman or trustee to arrest any boys or girls who, in their judgment; are violat-ing Section 1.

It shall be left to the judgment or dis-

It shall be left to the judgment or dis-rection of said officers as to whether the offender so arrested shall be taken home or placed in the village jail. SEC. 4—The penalty for repeated vio-lations of Section No. 1 shall be a term in the State Reform School at Lansing, Mich., at the discretion of the court hav-ing jurisdiction over such matters. SEC. 5—The fire bell of the village shall ring each and every night at hours named in Section 1, by the marshal or some other duly appointed by the village council.
