Of Interest to Dairymen

Of late there has been some little talk by dairymen adjacent to Detroit, in this and other localities, of a threatened "milk strike." In a conversation with the writer Thursday morning, Fred M. Warner of the Warner Cheese Company, said:

"The talk of cutting off the milk supply from the Detroit markets is having its effect already in an unexpected manner, here at least. We are now making up all of the milk at Powers and Franklin into cheese, and also part at the Farmington cheese plant. This is the first time in years that the Farmington plant has run during the month of September. The condition is brought about by some of the Detroit dealers becoming alarmed at the strike talk, and going out miles farther from Detroit and making contracts at new points for a year. 40 cans formerly shipped from Farmington to Detroit are now supplied by Lenawee county, and the local plant now has 40 more cans of milk to make into cheese, which loses money at present cheese and milk prices."

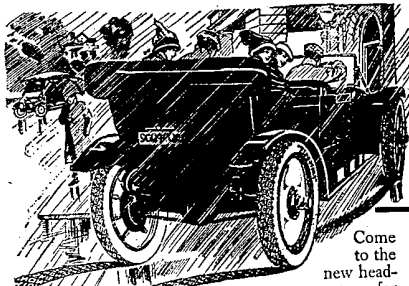
