Register of Deeds, Daniel A. McGaffey, Pontiac

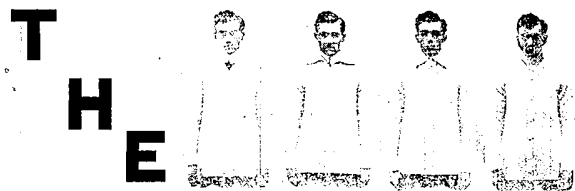
