## FERRIS GETS BIG MAJORITY

Republicans Make Clean Sweep of Most State and all County Offices.

Election day in Michigan did not bring out many surprises to the conservative student of political conditions, beyond a heavy decline in Progressive votes, which took a much bigger slump than had been anticipated, considering returns of two years ago.

Governor Woodbridge N. Ferris, Democrat, has been re-elected by a big plurality, which grows as each straggling report arrives. In Oakland county, Osborn for Governor was able to carry but one township, Lyon, and that by a majority of only four votes. Late accusations in regard to the liquor question are believed responsible for that majority.

Voting was brisk in Farmington the greater portion of the morning, and in fact all day, and a total of 334 votes were polled.

On the county ticket, the fight had practically centered on sheriff, prior to election. Tripp, Democrat, ran well ahead of the ticket, but was unable to win over Dwight L. Oliver. All other Republican county candidates had comparatively easy sledding.

For Congress Hon. Patrick Kelley has defeated his Democratic opponent by a big majority.

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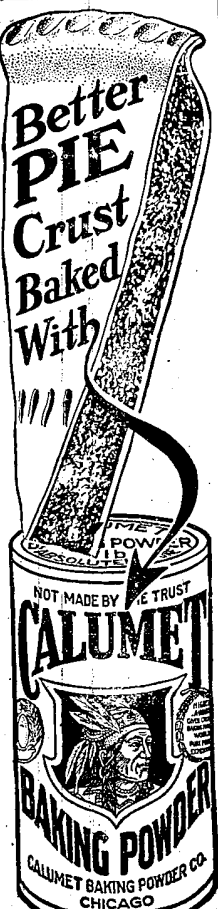
