SUPREME COURT WILL DETERMINE

Judge Smith of Circuit Court
intimated that 1760 Names
are Improperly Filed.

In Circuit Court at Pontiac
Wednesday morning, Judge Smith
denied the writ of mandamus which
attorneys for the "wet" interests
were asking against the Board of
Supervisors, in their action of sub-
mitting the local option matter at
the coming election, but in deny-
ing the writ, the Court stated that
he did not believe that he was right
in denying, in the instance of 1760
names, which were secured on sep-
arate petitions, but later pinned or
pasted together.

Attorneys for the "wets" now
feel certain of the case being de-
cided in their favor by the higher
court, and will at once take an
appeal, which Judge Smith urged
them to do. In giving his opinion,
Judge Smith said in part:

"There is doubt enough in this
case to warrant the relator in pro-
ceeding in the supreme court. This
case involves no record and coun-
sel have agreed on the facts. I feel
I am right in denying the writ as
to the 700 names offered on the
first day of the session but as to the
1760 I do not feel that I am right
at all in so holding, but I am de-
nying the writ for the purpose of
the record, and so it may be taken
to the supreme court. Personally
I think it is somewhat of a serious
problem."

On the face of the decision just
rendered, it would seem that the
"wets" have the best of the argu-
ment, in that if the 1760 names are
declared illegally filed by the high-
est court, it will mean that the
local option matter cannot be sub-
mitted at the coming Spring elec-
tion, as they would not then have
the required number of legal peti-
tioners.

Death Follows Freezing

After a battle for life extending
over a period of thirty one days,
or since Christmas morning, John
White, aged 18, succumbed to the
combined effects of freezing and
blood poisoning, breathing his last
at about 9:15 Monday night.

Every effort was made in the
hope of saving the young man's
life, and hope was held out until
Monday afternoon, when a promi-
nent Detroit surgeon and the at-
tending physician, Dr. E. F. Hol-
comb, pronounced further effort
useless. An operation for the am-
putation of several toes had been
planned for that afternoon, but
was deemed useless.

During his illness, and since the
fatal night when he laid through-
out the night in the snow, he had
been cared for at the Albert Sni-
kowski home.

The sad features of the case can-
not but draw the united sympathy
of the community, toward the be-
reaved relatives. In addition to
his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas.
White, he leaves three brothers
and a sister.

The funeral services were con-
ducted from the family home
Thursday afternoon, followed by
interment at Oakwood cemetery.

team. This was a well played
game, and the ability of Farming-
ton boys to make baskets when
they received the ball enabled
