Castro Not Deported Yet

That the new government of Venezuela must bring a judicial prosecution in a criminal court against Fidel Castro, ex-former president of Cuba, is a demand which the United States has made. The demand for his deportation officially, was stated by Count Luigi Adrovandi, who arrived in Caracas on Caracas on the 25th of January.

The actual political situation in Venezuela today is a peculiar one. The late Adrovandi says "Castro is not in the official position of the country under the terms of the Venezuelan constitution. In order to make Castro's position official, it will be necessary to impeach Castro in a criminal court, and I understand

...being taken will be brought against the nation on his alleged action in calling to P. M. Carothers, their de-
partmental government, an order for the killing of Gomez during the riots that followed Castro's departure from Cuba.
