ALL SKEPTICS READ THIS
 Prohibition Does Prohibit Under New Laws — A Close Study of the Leigh Law Recently Enacted, Invited.
 It is pertinent at this time when the question of local option comes before the voters of Oakland county to call attention to the fact that prohibition does prohibit.
 Those of our voters who have heretofore failed to take their stand as advocates of local option because of the feeling "Oh well, Local Option doesn't fit my good because people can carry intoxicants in anyway," are urged to read the following, a true copy of the laws of Michigan.
 Act 68 P. A. 1913.
 The People of the State of Michigan enact:

155 Section 1. No person shall while in an offensive state of intoxication enter or be on or remain upon any railway train or interurban car as a passenger.
 156 Section 2. No person shall publicly drink any intoxicating liquor as a beverage in any railway train or coach, or interurban car, or give, or cause to be given to any other person therein, intoxicating liquor as a beverage, except in a compartment or place where such liquor is sold, or served under the authority of a license lawfully issued.

157 Section 3. The conductor of any railway train or interurban car, may summarily arrest, with or without warrant, any person violating any of the foregoing provisions, and for such purpose shall have the same power and authority as any peace officer, including the power to summon assistance; and such conductor shall further have power to deliver any such person to any policeman, constable, or other public officer at the next station stop where such public officer can be found, and it shall be the duty of such officer to bring the person charged with such offense before the nearest justice of the peace or municipal court of the county where said offense was committed, and to make a complaint against such person, and such complaint made upon information and belief of said officer, shall be sufficient.
 158 Section 4. The conductor of any railway train or interurban car may take from any person found violating any of the foregoing provisions, any intoxicating liquor then in possession of such person and deliver the same to the nearest station agent, giving the person from whom it was taken a receipt therefor. Upon the presentation and surrender of such receipt within ten days thereafter such liquor shall be delivered to the person presenting same, and if not so delivered within such time shall be destroyed by such station agent.

159 Section 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars, or imprisonment in the county jail for not more than ninety days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.
 This is known as the Leigh law and is sufficient answer to that phase of the hitherto troublesome details of enforcing local option.
 Another great factor that is going to be instrumental in putting the saloon out of business in Oakland county, is the Pray Law, an instrument recently enacted by the legislature of the state of Michigan, which absolutely prohibits the shipment or profession of liquors for sale in no license territory. This law is too lengthy to be given here but can be readily ascertained by reading a copy of the laws enacted by the last legislature.
 These facts we print because we believe that every elector to place the vote which is his right and duty on April 5th should be thoroughly informed of every phase of this great question.
