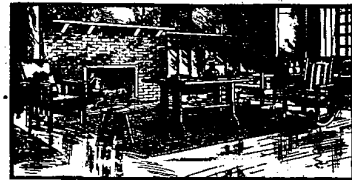
A special moving picture program was given at the Boys Home at Clarenceville Sunday afternoon and evening. A number from Farmington and vicinity were among those who enjoyed the program.
