The workmen in digging for the new foundations came upon a massive wall enclosing a circular space with a diameter of about 30 feet. When this was cleared of earth a well was found in the center measuring 6 feet across and about 30 feet in appth. Water rose in it clear and cold as seon as the earth had been cleared away from the bottom.
