A QUEER EASTER CUSTOM.

In Warwickshire, England, Shakespeare's home county, there was observed from ancient times a queer Easter custom known as "clipping the churches." It is described by an old time writer as follows:
"When I was a child, as sure as Easter Monday came, I was taken to see the children 'clip the churches.' This ceremony was performed amid crowds of people and shouts of joy by the children of the different parishes. Each ceremony was a certain hour flocked together for the purpose. The first comers placed themselves hand in hand with their backs against the church and were joined by their companions, who gradually increased in number till at last the chain was of sufficient length completely to surround the sacred edifice. As soon as the head of the last of the line had grasped that of the first, the party broke up and walked in procession to the other church: (or in those days Birmingham boasted of her two), where the ceremony was repeated."
Easter formerly witnessed many quaint customs in England, but most of them have died out in recent years.
