#### Battle in Clouds

#### Automobile Races

Noted drivers of space eating vehicles will attempt to shatter dirt track records. Night automobile racing, an innovation which is attracting thousands to the racing courses in the east, will be inaugurated at the 1915 State Fair. Auto races for women drivers will be featured.

#### Machinery Displays

Most modern types of farm machinery, including gaso-line engines, cream separators, silo fillers, and other time saving inventions of mechanical experts will at-tract the attention of Michigan rural residents especi-ally. The display in the machinery building will set a new record for size and the interest it will create.

#### Automobile Show


