That condition prevails in Farmington at the present time, there is seemingly no relief. Bidding houses to rent wouldn't necessarily be a charitable proposition to the town either, as most of the prospective tenants with whom we have talked, seemed perfectly willing and expecting to pay a substantial rental.

If there is one thing that the average citizen neglects more than any other it is our schools. Men and women as well who become greatly interested in every other form of public matter fail to respond to an appeal from or for the schools. As a result school meetings are sparsely attended, and whatever improvement is made or steps are taken by the directors, are invariably taken in the dark. A meeting has been called for Wednesday evening, September 22, at which the matter of providing additional room and equipment at our local school must be faced and faced squarely. Don't shirk your duty.

And again school is with us, and for the first few weeks at least is engaging the attention of pupils and parents alike. The new year starts out with colors flying, and excepting for the lack of room in one or two departments—in perfect harmony. The closing months of last year's term are too painful a subject for discussion. Pupils and teachers alike were often out of harmony, at times very nearly at the breaking point. Complaints and counter complaints were heard and in all probabilities, justified, in at least some instances. The school board has made every effort in its power to correct the evil, and this year, has put the school in charge of a new superintendent, who comes to us well recommended. The co-operation of the teaching staff and pupils, and the earnest support of parents and the board are now the only things needed to give us the desired relief and in such support a better school and more satisfactory results cannot but be attained. A condition like the one of last year is not wanted or expected, and would hardly be countenanced another year by parents of children attending.
