Farmington Physicians

Perhaps no class of men know
life in all its phases as well as the
average physician. Especially does
the sadder life present itself, for it
is the doctor that is appealed to
when pain and sickness make their
unwelcome appearance. How well
they do their part, how nobly they
combat disease, is a matter of
common knowledge.

This town has ever been the
home of men that were a credit to
the medical profession. The first
physician was Doctor Webb, who
lived in a log house that stood near
where Mt. Collins now lives. He
was also the first Postmaster.

Soon after him came Dr. Wixom,
a man of rough exterior of blunt
ways and forceful language, but
with a kindly heart and a wonder-
ful skill in the treatment of disease.
As a surgeon he excelled and was
he alive today, his work would make
him famous in that branch of the
medical science. In 1832 when
Asiatic cholera swept the country
and claimed its victims in the
pioneer settlement of Farmington
he rode horseback night and day
through the trackless woods and
fought this terrible and fatal
disease with unflinching heroism.
Dr. Hudson, whose office was lo-
cated near the house now occupied
by C. C. Philbrick was another
successful physician. I think he
studied with Doctor Wixom and
succeeded to the latter's practice
upon his removal to another loca-
tion. He it was that did what he
could to stay the ravages of the
disease that swept the town in the
early part of the year of 1848.

Young people were its victims. A
Ball was given New Years eve by
Isaac Cann, and in a space of six
short weeks almost a score of young
people who attended that function
had passed away. Most of them
were sick but a few hours. Brain
Fever was the name given to the
malady.

From Canada in 1853 came Dr.
A. F. Steinhoff, and while here
only about 18 months he made a
remarkable record as a successful
practitioner. He seemed to have
the esteem and confidence of the
entire community. He wore him-
self out in the service of the people
and gave up his life that others
might live. He died August 4,
1864. His funeral was conducted
by the Masonic fraternity and was
attended by more than 1,000 people.
Over his grave in Oakwood ceme-
try stands a marble shaft with the
fitting inscription, "He Saved
others but himself he could not
save." Among others who served
their day and generation well were
Doctors Moore, Avery and Wood-
man. They too, did all they could
to restore health and relieve suffer-
ing and have gone to their reward.
"After life's fitful fever they
sleep well." HIPPOCRATES.
