That old theory about the coal man reaping his harvest only in the winter has been effectually knocked in the head.

The departure of summer may have been auspicious but hardly conspicuous. Ditto the arrival of fall last Tuesday.

"Blight on U. S. Trade Extended to Rubber" says a morning paper headline, and charges British dictation. Wonder if that had anything to do with Michigan potatoes?

In some sections of Michigan this year farmers are suffering severe losses by reason of blight in potatoes. In some cases the tubers have simply rotted in the ground because of excessive rains. Of course, not the entire potato crop of the state is lost, but the percentage is considerable and to the losers a heavy one to bear. Whether the injury is widespread enough to affect prices will appear later in the market quotations. There is another side to the matter worth the notice of growers. It will be a wise thing to plant no potatoes for a year or two in ground where this year's crops rotted. And it will be well to select only the highest grade seed for next year's planting. These cautions may serve to prevent losses next year due to the lingering infection in soils from the decayed crops of this year. In some parts of Michigan, farmers were unable to gather their hay after cutting it. Consequently many tons of valuable fodder rotted in the fields. This loss may be turned to gain in another season by plowing under this decayed hay and planting grain crops, as wheat or oats. The lost hay will greatly fertilize the soil and give an increased yield. There is a hopeful side for the man who has lost both potatoes and hay.
