The remains of Alonzo Sprague, who died at the home of his daughter in Wayne, aged 93 years, were brought to Zessau's undertaking rooms Wednesday morning, and the funeral will occur Saturday at 1 o'clock. Burial at West Farmington cemetery. Mr. Sprague was a former resident of Farmington, and highly respected by a large number of friends.

At a special election in White Lake township there were 91 votes out of 99 cast favoring the return to Charles Skarritt, township treasurer, of the amount of township funds lost in the E. Jossman bank at Clarkston, where he had deposited the funds for safekeeping. The total loss was \$1873.42, of which \$1,113.42 has been returned to Mr. Skarritt in dividends paid by the bank receiver. The special election had to be authorized by the state legislature before the township could take any action in the matter.

The \$12,000 School bonds sold at a good price at the auction held Thursday evening at the school house, bringing \$75.00 premium, beside the accrued interest and saving the district another \$100 as the bonds do not have to be delivered until the money is needed. The expense of the issue is all to be paid by purchaser, while the bonds bear 4½ per cent. On this sale they net only 4¼ per cent. The plans for the new building will be completed within ten days, and the board will advertise at once for bids. Bumpus & Co., of Detroit, were the purchasers of the bonds.
