Twins" to the Primary children.

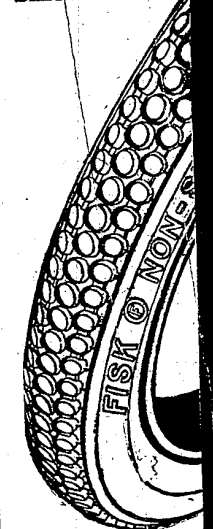
