Our plan to profit-share with retail purchasers of Ford cars during 1914-15 has been most successful. We thoroughly believe in it, by realizing the uncertainty of conditions generally makes it advisable to defer any announcement of future profit-sharing until a later date.

We are, however, confident of our inability to reduce costs for several months, and therefore can offer no profit-sharing for cars delivered during August, September and October, 1915.

A MISTAKEN IDEA

The local merchant, not being compelled to hustle, is content with whatever drifts into his store in the way of business, and often neglects to advertise as he should, claiming that his business must come to him because there is no where else to buy. He is very much mistaken.

The local express office, freight depot and post office could tell far different tales. The rural communities of today are in far more prosperous condition than they ever have been before. The local stores are the same as they always were with a few shining exceptions. This newly acquired wealth has not all gone into the bank, but into various appliances for the home and farm. Most of them were ordered through some farm paper or magazine because of advertising.

What's the matter with the local merchants? They hewl it their business is taken away, but make no effort to hold it themselves. They claim they cannot compete with the big mail order concerns who print big catalogs and sell lots of goods, but they know not whereof they speak.

One of the large magazines which maintains a staff of men to investigate and tabulate business statistics, publishes a little table which would open the eyes of the merchants. It costs the mail order concerns 30 per cent to do business; the department stores spend almost 25 per cent for the privilege, because of high rents, credits, extensive delivery systems, heavy advertising expense, and costly catalogs.

The small stores run less than 15 per cent, and by the methods of the large jobbers, their purchases are not much more than those of the catalog concerns who buy in carload lots.

The remedy is advertising. The man who sees a separator advertised in his farm paper and sends a check of \$40 for it, would much rather see it in his local store and talk the purchase over with the store keeper before taking it home. But the store keeper does not advertise a separator, even though he could do so and make eight or ten dollars on it. But he sits back and bewails the cruelty of the catalog houses and other people who come in and take away the business he has built up.

It may be interesting to know that Michigan leads all states in the number of sugar beet factories. Colorado comes next with one less. Yet Michigan comes third in the production of sugar, Colorado and California stepping ahead. Michigan produces this year about 100,000 tons of the 500,000 produced.

The new auto license law gives the county road fund one-half of the license money collected in that county. It is estimated that there will be 150,000 licenses issued during 1916, at an average of between \$10 and \$15 which will give the state highway department \$1,500,000.
