GERMANY TELLS ONE BIG POINT

No More Merchantmen to Be Sunk by Submarines Without Visit and Search.

REPLY TO AMERICAN NOTE

Berlin Still 'Hunts Sussex Fates, Accuses United States of Favoritism and Exalts Britain's 'Illegal' Warfare.

Berlin—Following is the text of the note of the German government's reply to the American note respecting submarine warfare, delivered by the German ambassador to the United States, James W. Gerard:

The undersigned, on behalf of the Imperial German government, has the honor to present to his excellency the ambassador of the United States, James W. Gerard, the following reply to the note of April 29 regarding the conduct of German submarine warfare.

The German government has received the proper naval authorities for the investigation of the results that the investigation has hitherto yielded. The German government has no objection to the investigation being continued, and it is mentioned in the note of April 18 as having been terminated by a German submarine. It is acknowledged that the Sussex is a merchantman.

Further Investigation Of Case to Be Made.

The German government begins to receive further communication on the subject until certain points are ascertained which are of decisive importance for establishing the facts in the case. Should it turn out that the command was wrong in assuming the vessel to be a man-of-war, the German government will not fail to take the consequences resulting therefrom.

In connection with the case of the Sussex, the United States has made a series of statements, the gist of which is the assertion that the incident to be considered is not an instance of a deliberate method of indiscriminate destruction of vessels of neutral nationality, but a case of a German submarine commander's mistake.

Denies the Assertion: Facts Not Furnished.

The German government must emphatically repudiate the assertion. The German government, however, claims it is not possible to enter into details in the present stage of affairs, more particularly as the government of the United States has not furnished the facts by reference to concrete facts.

The German government will only state that it has imposed far-reaching restraints upon the use of the submarine weapon, solely in consideration of neutral interests. In spite of the fact that these restrictions are not only applied to German submarines, but also to the submarines of other nations, no such consideration has ever been shown by the United States.

Special Orders Had Been Given U-Boats.

The German submarine forces have had, in fact, orders to avoid the use of the submarine weapon in accordance with the principles of visit and search and the destruction of merchant vessels, recognized by international law, the sole exception being the conduct of warfare against enemy merchant vessels in the zone surrounding Great Britain. With regard to this, no assurances have ever been given by the government of the United States. No such assurances are contained in the declaration of February 3, 1915.

As the German government repeatedly declared, it cannot use the submarine weapon in the conduct of warfare against enemy trade. The German government has, however, decided to make it a further concession, adapting methods of submarine warfare to the interests of neutral nations.

In reaching this decision the German government is actuated by motives which are above the level of the disputed question.

Keeps Principles of Humanity in View.

The German government attaches no less importance to the sacred principles of humanity than the government of the United States. It again fully takes into account that both governments for many years have been engaged in developing international law in conformity with these principles, the ultimate object of which has been to bring about a more peaceful and land to armed forces of belligerents and to safeguard as far as possible non-combatants against the horrors of war. But although these considerations are of great weight, they alone would not determine the attitude of the German government.

For in answer to the appeal by the government of the United States on behalf of the sacred principles of humanity and civilization, the German government must repeat once more with all emphasis, that it was not the German government that initiated the use of the submarine weapon in the conduct of warfare against enemy trade.

As matters stand, the German government cannot but reiterate regret that the sentiments of humanity which the government of the United States expresses with such fervor to the unhappy victims of submarine warfare are not extended with the same warmth to the German people, millions of women and children who, according to the avowed intention of the British government, will be the victims of submarine warfare.

"LO, WE TURN TO THE GENTILES."

LESSON TEXT—Acts 13:45-48.

GOLDEN TEXT—I have set thee free, a night of the Gentiles, that thou shouldst be for salvation unto the utter part of the earth—Acts 13:47.
