

CENTENNIAL PROGRAM

Women of Oakland County to Take Part in Celebration—Farmington Women Given Place of Honor

That the women of the county are boosting the Centennial movement is given evidence on every side. Nearly every club is planning a float to compete with those of the other organizations, and every unit in the community is loyally trying to feature its own particular interest.

All through the development of Oakland county the women have from the beginning nobly borne their part toward the growth of this commonwealth, but it is only during the last 30 or 35 years that their activities have been directed through concerted effort, so that now their influence represented in many organizations, is a still more important factor in community life.

To place before the public the evidence of this great working force and also to give every woman in Oakland county a chance to take part in this celebration, a parade has been planned for August 21, in which all women's societies of the county are invited to take part. Every woman is called upon to assist in making this day of celebration worthy of the splendid service she has been able to give her county in the past and a pledge of her future loyalty. The church, fraternal, literary, patriotic and civic societies will each form separate sections. The Mothers and Teachers' clubs have charge of the first section of the parade, which will be of mothers and babies in automobiles, signifying that motherhood is placed before any other social interest. The mothers clubs have also made arrangements for an exhibition of babies to be held at the high school auditorium on the afternoon of Woman's Day. Prizes will be given to the babies between six months and two years of age, who score the highest in physical development.

The order of the program for Woman's Day, August 21, 9:00 a. m., (central standard time) election by band; opening address by D. L. Davis, president of Oakland County Pioneer and Historical Society; 9:10 address of welcome, Mayor Lounsbery; presentation of keys of city to county; 9:20, response by J. L. Hogle, chairman of Board of Supervisors. The program is then given over to the women and a procession led by the band will march to the bridge on Saginaw street in the following order: Oakland County Pioneer and Historical Society officers, Centennial execu-

tive Committee, board of supervisors, city commissioners, Woman's Literary Club, Daughters of the American Revolution, Woman's Relief Corps; 9:30, address by Mrs. Otto Sachse, president of the Woman's Literary club, dedicating tablet; response by Commissioner, George A. Brown. The procession will return to Water street. 10 a. m., address by Mrs. S. E. Beach, regent of General Richardson Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution; response by Mayor Lounsbery; procession then marches to Fairgrove avenue; 10:30 a. m., address by Mrs. J. S. Young, presiding officer of the Woman's Relief Corps, dedicating boulder; response by Commissioner J. L. McLintock; 11 a. m., Woman's Equal Suffrage Society will give a series of Tableaux on the north steps of the court house. 1:00 o'clock parade; 2 o'clock, dedication of school tablet at the Central school; address by Mrs. L. C. Nisbett, chairman of the Mothers' and Teachers' clubs; response by Commissioner George A. Brown; 3:00 o'clock, exhibition of babies at Pontiac High school. The program for the week, beginning next Monday, August 21, is as follows: Sunday, August 20—Church Day. Monday, August 21—Woman's Day. Tuesday, August 22—Fraternal Day. Wednesday, August 23—Oratorical Day. Thursday, August 24—Historical Day. Friday, August 25—Commercial Day. Saturday, August 26—Labor Day.

Each of the above days will be a big day and everyone is planning on spending most of the week in Pontiac.

On fraternal day the fraternal orders of the county will take part in the parade, with an electric pageant in the evening. Oratorical day will be observed with speeches by prominent men of the county and a big choral program in the evening, while historical day will be observed with a historical pageant, consisting of floats from every township in the county, and a band concert in the evening, in which all bands of the county will take part. The merchants of the city of Pontiac and the county will have charge of commercial day, and floats representing the different lines of merchandise will be in parade, while the electric pageant of Tuesday will be repeated. On labor day a big confetti battle will be presented and the evening given over to fireworks, making a solid week of fun, interest and pleasure.

The Woman's parade for the Oakland Centennial will take place Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock (central standard time) at Pontiac. Farmington will be represented as follows: Large float showing woman's progress in 100 years, supplemented by appropriately decorated automobiles from the various societies in the village, North and East Farmington.

The German Society will lead in the number of autos placed in line numbering at least eight. Ladies having automobiles are requested to use them to carry those who might not be able to go otherwise. Everybody turn out on Monday and "root" for your home town and its public spirited women.

In this cause it appearing to the satisfaction of the court from the sworn bill of complaint, that the defendants hereto have some apparent claim, title, interest, lien, or possible right to the premises described in said bill of complaint, and hereinafter described, and said plaintiff averring that all the title, interest, claims, liens, or possible rights of the said defendants and each of them, are barred by continuous, open, notorious, exclusive, adverse and peaceable possession of said plaintiff and their grantors for more than twenty-five years last past and for more than twenty-five years since the several rights to the possession thereof accrued in said respective defendants, and that said possession has been for all of said time, and still is adverse and hostile to the title, claim, interests, liens, or possible rights of said respective defendants; that the plaintiff does not know and that it could not be ascertained after diligent search and inquiry, whether said named defendants are living or dead or where they reside if living or whether their title, interest, claims, liens, or possible rights, if any have been assigned to any person or persons, or if dead, whether they have personal representatives or heirs living, or where they or any of them may reside, or whether said title, interest, claim, lien, or possible right has been disposed of by will, and

IT APPEARING, that all of said parties, or their unknown heirs, devisees, legatees and assigns of each and every of them, are proper and necessary parties-defendants to said suit;

On motion of Pelton & McGee, attorneys for plaintiff;

IT IS ORDERED, that the appearance of said defendants, Charles Collins, Minerva Beebe, Laura Durham, Julia M. Durham, Charles I. Collins, James Harvey Collins, Charles Revilo Collins, George Carswell, Jr., Peter Dix, and the unknown wife of David Maiden, or the unknown heirs, devisees, legatees and assigns of each and every of them be entered in this cause within three months from the date of this order and that in case of such appearance each defendant so appearing shall cause his or her answer to the said bill of complaint to be filed in this court, and a copy thereof served upon plaintiff's attorneys within fifteen days after service upon him or her of a copy of said bill of complaint, and that in default of such appearance or answer said bill shall be taken as confessed by the said defendant, and each and every of them so in default, and

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, that within twenty days from the date hereof the said plaintiff cause a copy of this order to be published in the Farmington Enterprise, a newspaper printed, published and circulated in the county of Oakland, and that the publication thereof shall continue therein once in each week for six successive weeks.
