Mrs. George Rinke was a Detroit visitor Thursday, and Sunday Gus Jaddatz, Jr., and mother were entertained at her home.

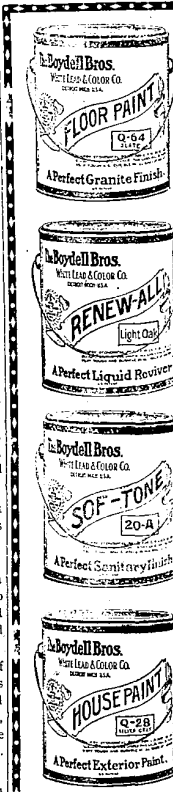
