Cars leave Farmington Junction for Detroit at 5:25 a. m., 7:00 a. m., and hourly thereafter until 1:00 p. m. Black cars, except first morning car, leave Farmington ten minutes earlier.

Cars leave Farmington Junction for Orchard Lake and Pontiac at 6:00 a. m., 8 a. m. and every two hours to 2 p. m.; then hourly to 6 p. m., and every two hours to midnight.

Cars leave Farmington for Northville at 5 a. m. and hourly thereafter until 1:00 p. m. Black cars leave Detroit for Farmington at 5 p. m. and hourly thereafter until 1:00 p. m. Last car being held for theaters.

Cars leave Pontiac for Orchard Lake, Farmington, and Northville at 7:05 a. m., 8:05 a. m., 9:05 a. m. and every two hours to 3:05 p. m.; then hourly to 7:05 p. m.; then every two hours to 11:05 p. m., and a car for Farmington Junction only at 12:05 a. m.

Cars leave Northville for Farmington at 5:15 a. m. and hourly thereafter until 11:30 a. m.

First cars one hour later on Sundays.

All cars run on Central Standard Time. All cars make close connections at terminal points with cars on other lines of the Detroit United Lines.
