Bids shall be addressed to the Board of Education, c/o Director of Plans and Services, 32800 Shawasssee, Farmington, Michigan 4803, until 3:00 P.M. Tuesday, September 25, 1973.

The work consists of the replacement of the existing oil fired burners with forced draft gas fired package burners. Other work involved includes gas piping, controls, and miscellaneous revisions required for completion of these projects.

Plans and specifications may be obtained at the office of the Director of Plans and Services, 32800 Shawasssee, Farmington, Michigan.

The Owner will require the accepted bidder to provide a Performance Bond in the amount of 100% of the contract, including all labor and material.

Proposals must be submitted on forms furnished by the Board of Education and must be accompanied by a certified check or bidder's bond, payable to the Board of Education of the Farmington Public Schools for a sum not less than Five Per Cent (5%) of the amount of the proposal.
