Franklin Handles GC West, 23-18

Franklin High's 1973 football campaign was just 12 seconds along and Coach George Lovich knew the green light was on towards a championship season. Junior back Joe Pollard returned the opening kickoff against Garden City West for 79 yards and a touchdown and the Patriot power had exploded forth in 12 seconds. It was on the scoreboard

for Franklin again the next time it got its hands on the ball. The Patriots marched from their own 30 to the West three yard line in 15 plays and fumbled on its splitting the posts for a field goal and Franklin had a 9-0 lead.

The very next time Franklin got the ball, there was a score again but this time West crossed the goal line.

On a second down and two play, Franklin quarterback Larry Casey fumbled the snap and West's Mike Carr picked it up and dashed 79 yards. A two point play failed and Franklin maintained the margin at 9-7.

After an exchange of punts, West was caught deep in its zone and fumbled on its own four with Franklin's Todd Mapes pouncing on the

loose ball. Quarterback Casey completed the score with a spurt around right end, Quinn made good the conversion and with 6:28 remaining in the half, Franklin was up, 15-6.

The second quarter saw West slice it to 16-12. Currier intercepted a stray Casey pass and Tiger QB Terry Dobbs whipped a 42 yard toss to Bill

Underwood. A two pointer failed and it stood 16-12 at the half.

There was no scoring in the third quarter with Franklin breaking back into the scoring column in the fourth.

A nine yard punt by West gave Franklin possession on the Tiger 53. The Patriots marched the distance in seven plays with Greg Battistone taking it in from 14

yards out, Quinn converted and the score was 23-12, with 2:54 remaining.

A nine yard Dobbs to Mike Calamita pass cut it to 23-18 with 1:44 left.

Franklin collected 13 first downs to 12 by West and out-rushed the Tigers, 183 to 75. West hit on 13 of 23 passes for 141 yards while Franklin made good seven of 14 for 76 yards.

Battistone pounded out 87 yards in 14 carries and Quinn 75 yards in 14 carries to pace the Franklin attack which also collected 115 yards in penalties in 11 calls.

One Second Left, Stevenson Wins

A six yard touchdown pass from Mark Temby to Ray Davis with one second remaining spelled the difference in a Stevenson come from behind victory over Redford Union, 14-12.

It was the seventh meeting between the two rival clubs with Stevenson now holding a 4-3 edge.

"It was a tough one to lose," said RU Coach Bob Atkins whose squad finished 6-3 last year after dropping the opener to the Spartans, 19-7. "Our kids had that game won for 47 minutes and 59 seconds."

"We just lost," concluded Atkins.

For Stevenson it was a half-control victory. The Spartans ran a total of 65 plays compared to only 33 by RU. Stevenson chalked up 12 first downs to RU's seven and out-rushed the Panthers, 276 to 232.

Paul Lulek was the spark-plug in the Spartan assault with 147 yards in 22 carries.

A Stevenson 60 yard drive was halted early in the first quarter with RU's Tom Bogdonas picking off a stray Spartan pass on his own 21

and moved it out to Stevenson's 47.

On the first play from scrimmage, Bogdonas broke loose for 47 yards and six points for RU.

Another Stevenson drive was halted by an interception, this one a 65 yard march that included 15 plays and the half ended in a 6-0 score.

Stevenson power pushed the ball to the RU, seven early in the third but the Panther line kept the Spartans in check. On the second play after taking control of the ball, RU fumbled on the nine and Lulek plunged to the one where Mark Temby dashed in. Bob Hope made good the conversion and Stevenson had a 7-6 margin.

RU bounced back on a 58 yard punt return in the

fourth. A two-point effort missed but RU had the lead again, 12-7.

Stevenson failed to move the ball, punted to RU and with 3:42 Coach Atkins called for a play he wished he could have taken back.

Dave Smith went to the air and Davis intercepted for Stevenson on his own 25. Lulek broke loose for 25 yards.

On a fourth down and nine situation, Temby hit Chuck Rice for 36 yards and a touchdown with one second remaining.

Temby then hit Davis for the deciding score, Hope converted and Stevenson had again captured the Panther. RU travels to Allen Park Friday for its Suburban Eight opener and Stevenson plays at Franklin Saturday afternoon.

Bentley Harriers Capture Crown

Overall depth and team strength is what Bentley High cross country coach Ron Fedraw ordered for the 1973 season and that is exactly what captured top billing in the 21 school meet sponsored by Schoolcraft College.

Livonia Bentley came up with a five-man showing of 89 points to sweep top honors in the eighth annual high school cross country meet put on by Schoolcraft Community College.

Dearborn was second with 106 points, with last year's No. 2 team in the state, Stevenson finishing third at 118.

Individual champion was Dearborn Heights Riverside runner Bill Donakowski with a 16:01.3 clocking. Last year's individual Schoolcraft champion went with all state honors Mike McGuire of Farmington was forced to watch from the sidelines due

to the strike in the Farmington School District.

Donakowski's time of 16:01.3 bettered McGuire's record setting pace of '72 which was 16:09. The now senior McGuire ran a practice time of 15:50 before the Schoolcraft meet.

Steve White of Stevenson placed second behind Donakowski at 16:13, Edsel Ford's Mike Watson third at 16:15, and Mark Olliv of Bishop Borgess fourth at 16:17.

Taking fifth place honors was Stevenson's Rick Gando at 16:22 with Dan Vischer of Dearborn Heights in sixth at 16:29 followed by teammate Frank Celecki at 16:31.

Bentley followed up with eighth and ninth places in Jay Kirksey at 16:34 and Tom Hoesy at 16:38 with Fordson's Joe Talanges in 10th win with a 16:39 time.

Placing behind Bentley, Dearborn and Stevenson were: Hazel Park (163), Churchill (169), Edsel Ford (230), Wayne (234), Bishop Borgess (234), Fordson (250), Thurston (291), GC West (310), GC (397), Redford Union (497), Plymouth Canton (532) and Plymouth Salem (626).
