SC Series Consider Female Status, Jobs

Growing up as a female and employment opportunities for women will be the subjects of two Schoolcraft College discussion series beginning next week.

The college's women's continuum is sponsoring both "Growing Up Female," scheduled to begin Monday, Oct. 15, from 1 to 3 p.m., and "Let's Take Another Look at Occupations," planned Tuesdays from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. beginning Oct. 16. Each series runs six weeks.

There is no charge for either series. Women wishing to register should call the Schoolcraft Continuum office. Nancy Dufour, continuum head, and Lynn Baakes will lead the discussions on femaleness, to be held in room B240 in the Liberal Arts Building on the Schoolcraft campus.

The number of participants will be limited to 25.

Mrs. Dufour said the series will give women an opportunity to share feelings and awareness of being female in America.

Topics may include mar-

riage and the family, education, religion, laws, biological and psychological sex differences, the job market, health care services for women, women in other cultures and developing a separate identity and changes in lifestyles.

Actual discussion topics will be set and researched by the entire group. Guest speakers and films may be arranged.

The series on job opportunities, with Mrs. Dufour as discussion leader, will be held in room 102 of the college's new instructional center at 23205 Florence, Garden City.

This series will give women an opportunity to take a

closer look at 30 or more occupations with emphasis on the tasks involved in doing the work, skills and abilities necessary, the training required, the outlook for women in the area, earnings and working conditions.

Some occupations covered will be in the health fields, human relations fields, business, the social service fields, science and technical areas.

Participants will meet in a group of 20 to discuss their own experiences in the work world and their knowledge of the work experiences of others.

Occupational materials will be available for review.
