## Hills Council Urges Anti-Busing Hearings

FARMINGTON The Farmington Hills City Council supported the efforts of the Tri County Citizens organization to petition the state legislature for public hearings on the issue of cross-district busing to achieve racial balance.

Councilman Earl Oppenheimer introduced the resolution. It was based on petitions being circulated by the Tri-County Citizens, which include a solicitation for funds for the anti-busing group.

Councilman Margaret Schaefer abstained from voting on the issue, saying "I don't feel this is within the authority of this council."

The council, shortly before adopting the resolution, had refused to consider local legislation governing campaign spending and reporting of committees on the grounds that both were within the jurisdiction of county and state governments.

The petition urges the state to hold hearings on the rights of citizens to send their children to local schools, to not be bused to Detroit schools, and to live where they choose to live.

Schafer abstained from voting on the issue, saying "I don't feel this is within the authority of this council."
