Most 16-year-old guys spend their spare moments discussing girls and sports, reading Sports Illustrated and checking out the sports section of the reversioner. section of the newspaper.

But Mike Shpiece of Farmington is preoccupied with politics, reading the Congressional Record and keeping track of political columns and editorials in the news-

Shpiece, who'll turn 17 in November, is a senior at Harrison High School and probably the most faithful observer of the Farmington Board of Education in all of Farmington.

He's been attending the meetings about as regularly

as board members since he was 14. as the board members for the last two years and at 16 can already boast he has spent "most of my life" campaigning for Democrats.

He's too young to be a precinct delegate but is a member of the executive board of the Oakland County Demo-cratic committee and the Farmington Democratic organization.

Politics is tops among his interests, as evidenced by the library in his home at-

Westmoreland. filled with his copies of the Congressional Record from the past few years.

Shplece attended a one-week workshop in Washington D.C. during the summer where he heard several national figures and came within "about 10 feet" of President Richard Nixon and Soviet Premier Leonid Breshnev during the welcome for Breshnev during his visit to the United States.

In discussing politics, he predicted Vice President Spiro Agnew's resignation about a week before it happened and said that Michigan Gov. William Milliken was a likely replacement for Ag-

After the nomination of U.S. Rep. Gerald Ford (R-Grand Rapids) he said that since Grand Rapids isn't far from Lansing "I was only off by a few miles."

On Agnew's resignation,
Simplece said, "It upsets me
that with all the evidence
against Agnew and his own admission of guilt, his fare-well speech said that what he

did wasn't wrong.
"I'm happy that it appears
as though we are starting to

rout the corruption out of our government," he added.

Gerald Ford is a good candidate for the office, he con-ceded, but said that "Ford should be judged not only on his personal qualifications and his honesty but I think he should be judged on his philosophy also.

"No one would support a vice president and president in an election because they were honest men if they didn't agree with the philosophy of the candidates," he said, "It shouldn't make any difference now because this is a resignation rather than an election."

Ron Emmitt Steps Down From Board

Ronald W. Emmitt, vice president of the Farmington Board of Education, has re-

In a letter Tuesday to Dr. Mervyn B. Ross, board president. Emmitt said he was resigning as of Oct. 22 for "personal reasons."

Reaction by board mem-bers was generally one of

William Corliss said, "I extremely regret his resigna-tion. While we did not always agree on issues, he (Emmitt) had the best interest of the community at heart." Elizabeth Brennan said she

received the news "with regret," while Emma Maki-nen said, "I am sorry to see him leave and express my appreciation to him for his work while serving on the board."

Gary Lichtman suggested the board send Emmitt a letter expressing sincere re-grets at his resignation. This was approved by the board.

Emmitt, who had been a board member for a little over 3½ years, said he had been considering resigning for the past two weeks.

"My decision was not the result of animosity toward

any members of the board," Emmitt said.

He said the demands of his firm, Emmitt Scientific Inc., have increased, allowing him less time to devote to other

"I'm sorry I didn't get some of the things accom-plished that I had intended to, however I intend to contribute to the Farmington

schools as much as I can."
He said he hoped to try and develop the interest of other persons to work with and help the board of educa-

"This community is fortunate to have a strong reserve of persons who can contrib-ute to our schools," Emmitt said.

He was high in praise of

"Although we didn't al-ways agree, Farmington does have some of the finest persons in the community involved with the school board."

Emmitt said he had always been treated fairly by the press and "I appreciate what the newspapers have done for me, they have always been fair."

No action was taken Tuesday night on a replace-ment for Emmitt.
