Mercy knocked off Livonia Stevenson in the state quarterfinals, 64-29, and will meet Detroit Dominican tonight (Friday) in the semifinals at Grand Blanc high school at 8

The other semifinal sets East Lansing against Grand Rapids. Lansing nipped Trenton, 49-48, and Christian topped Flint Carman, 35-31.

The winners of the Mercy -Dominican and East Lansing · Christian contest will meet tomorrow (Saturday) at Grand Blanc for the first girls state championship. Tipoff is set for 2:30 p.m.

The Marlins, coached by Rose Swidzinska, jumped to first quarter lead, boosted it to 37-18 at the half, dipped to 46-25 after three



quarters and coasted home with an 18-4 fourth quarter

"My girls just got the jit-ters," said Stevenson Coach Liz Embree whose Spartans inished off the season with a 142 mark. "We couldn't put anything in the bucket. We couldn't get any sort of an offense rolling.
"I really have to admit

that Mercy put it to us," added the Stevenson coach. They have to be the best team we have ever played. They have the advantage of playing CYO ball in the earlier grades and have been through all of this before.

"It will take awhile for the public schools to get it all together but we'll be back."

Stevenson had one girl in double figure scoring in senior Eileen McMahon with 12 points. Her Spartans netted just nine field goals, Miss McMahon with five of those. Mercy, which hit 24 buckets, and 16 of 32 from the line boasted high scorers in Diane Wink with 13 points and Lori Zessin with 11.

Three minutes into the contest, Mercy built an 8-0 margin. Lorraine Hyman finally got the Spartans on the board with a two - pointer but Farmington's Wink, Judeen Bartos and Donna Sass all hit and Mercy was up, 14-2.

Mary Anne Thompson then pickeď up a hot hand for Mercy, popped in six points and Farmington was up to a 24-7 first quarter advantage.

Mercy went three minutes

without scoring in the second quarter. Stevenson missed on six one - and - one situations and trailed at the half, 37-18.
