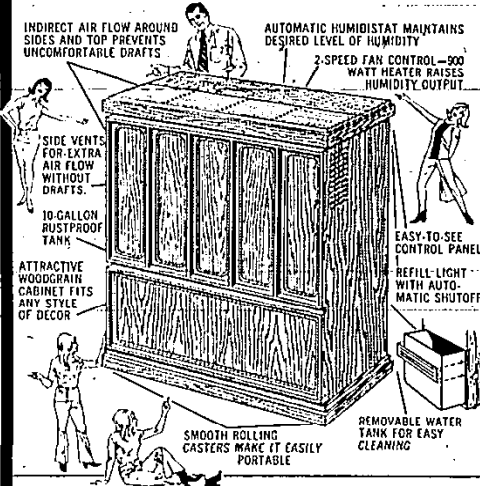

The tournament plays the same number of rating points as sectional events. Last - minute reservations will be accepted on a first - come - first - served basis.

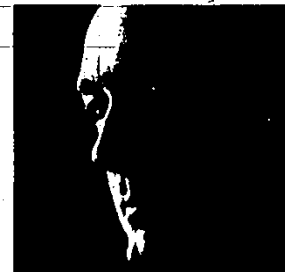
The Mayfair Club, now in its ninth year, meets regularly every Friday at 8 p.m.
