#### Legislative Notes.

After a spirited fight in the house the Hally home rule bill, although greatly amended and changed from its original draft, passed and is now up to Gov. Warner for his signature. The bill when it came up for final passage, passed with but eight votes against it. The opposition to this bill was the section which provided that cities may condemn property outside their limits for purposes of disposing of sewage and obtaining pure water. The bill in favor of the bill, however, was turned when attention was called to a clause in the constitution which gives cities and villages absolute authority to go beyond their boundaries with condemnation proceedings in the interest of health and safety.
