

Dr. Ellens is Knight of Malta

Dr. J. Harold Ellens, minister of University Hills Christian Reformed Church of Farmington, now is a member of the Knights of Malta.

He was knighted in a recent New York ceremony by Queen Juliana of the Netherlands and awarded the Maltese Cross with a ruby setting by Prince Bassaraba von Brancovan, grand chan-

cellor and grand bailiff for the order.

Dr. Ellens, who serves as U.S. Army Reserve chaplain in the 323rd General Hospital in Livonia in addition to his pastoral duties, was one of 10 new Knights of Grace.

Dr. Harold W. Wilkie, executive director for the council of ministry for the United Churches of Christ, one of the others knighted, also was designated prelate of the Knights of Malta.

The ceremony took place Jan. 7 in New York's First Presbyterian Church on Fifth Avenue, and Mrs. Ellens accompanied her husband to New York for the bestowal of knighthood.

The honor, announced in November by an emissary of Queen Juliana in New York, resulted in part from a series of lectures Dr. Ellens delivered between 1962 and 1972 in the headquarters of U.S. Army Chaplain School, Fort Hamilton, N.Y.

The lectures dealt with questions of national and international policy which became crucial concerns during the U.S. involvement in Vietnam.

Fr. Reid of St. Agatha is dead

The Rev. John T. Reid, who founded St. Agatha Catholic Parish in Redford Township in 1948 and has been its pastor ever since, died Monday in Florida.

Cardinal John Dearden, archbishop of Detroit, officiated for the funeral mass Thursday in the church at 19650 Beech Daly. Burial was in Holy Sepulchre.

Fr. Reid, who was ordained in 1932, led his parish

in a 25th anniversary celebration during 1973. Various events throughout the year marked the parish's quarter-century of service.

The clergyman celebrated his first mass in this area June 16, 1948, and saw St. Agatha grow through the years. Its facilities now include a sanctuary, complete grade school and high school, and a rectory, convent and gym.

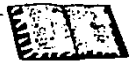
Bloodmobile plans made at Madonna
