Schools return 'gift' money

FARMINGTON — A \$6,000 gift from the former Wood Creek Farms Council will be returned to the City of Farmington Hills by the Farmington Board of Education.

The school board voted 4-2 to return the gift, with Trustees Gary Lichtman and William Corliss in opposition.

Board President Dr. Mervyn Ross indicated "discussions" with the Hills council had resulted in a promise to use the money toward the Gill Rd. paving project, a muddy strip which closed two schools last spring.

"I think I have made my position clear in the past on these issues," Lichtman said.

The money was donated to the school board for the improvement of the grounds at Wood Creek Elementary by the former Wood Creek Council.

A subsequent ruling by Hills attorney Joseph T. Brennan indicated the gift, as well as a \$1,000 donation to the Sarah Fisher home, was illegal.

Dr. Ross said while school board attorney Robert Kelly said the gift was proper, the attorney also indicated a lawsuit would cost more than the gift.
