

Spreen details year's use of new jail

PONTIAC — Annual reports issued by the Oakland County Sheriff's Dept. indicate a busy year in 1973 for the jail, marine division, helicopter crew, and special services division.

Some 15,868 inmates were admitted to the law enforcement complex, with a near daily capacity of 497 males and 46 females. A total of 517,500 meals were served and 4,751 inmates were transferred to other prison facilities upon being sentenced by Oakland Circuit Court.

The sheriff's department computers relayed 2,447 messages, entered 2,046 warrants for wanted persons, and cancelled 1,379 warrants as a result of police arrests for a total of 191,025 messages being sent and received by teletype operators.

Other statistics for 1973 including workload included: 440 polygraph examinations; 16,655 fingerprints taken; 19,351 photographs; 47,170 identification studies; and 2,344 handguns registered. The department investigated about 38,000 crimes resulting in 1,175 arrests.

A new training program was instituted during the year, says Sheriff Johannes Spreen, with 197 deputies attending in-service training and 68 attending schools elsewhere. All instructors used donated their time and materials so the county had a cost of only \$500, adds Spreen.

The marine division is responsible for patrolling lakes in the county, providing boating instruction, snowmobile patrol and training, and recovery of bodies from lakes. This division spent more than 6,900 hours during the summer of 1973 for such items as: 39 drowning calls; 44 boating accidents; 288 complaints; 97 jarceries of boats, motors or equipment; 45 boat safety inspections; and 2,689 inspections of pleasure boats.

Of the 669 watercraft violations issued, the largest number was for improper equipment. Some 40 water safety lectures were presented for some 3,266 persons.

For the snowmobile program in 1973, 91 complaints were received, 22 accidents reported, and 15 tickets issued. Some 76 snowmobiling classes were held for 5,408 persons.

In 1973, the department acquired a second helicopter, a Bell G-1A obtained from military surplus and reconditioned. The copters are used for rescue, searches, surveillance, and emergency life saving assistance.



OU enrollment continues climb

ROCHESTER — Record fall and winter enrollments are enabling Oakland University to exceed its state budgeted enrollment total for fiscal 1973 - 74, announces President Donald D. O'Dowd.

The 1974 winter enrollment is 9,122 headcount students or 3,138 FYES compared with 8,365 students and 3,040 FYES in winter 1973. The enrollment this fall was 9,638 students or 3,424 FYES, an all-time OU record.

OU's enrollment is growing in the face of generally declining enrollments can be attributed to various factors, claims O'Dowd. Among them are new undergraduate curricular options, a growing credit evening program, an expansion of the graduate programs, and the institution's location in a rapidly growing area of the state. We are convinced Oakland will continue to grow throughout the decade.

New master's programs started this fall include: management, history, early childhood education, and guidance and counseling.

New undergraduate curricular options include: medical technology, medical physics, environmental health technology, journalism, speech communication, computer sciences, and theater arts.

In addition, OU is providing general education courses for 300 nursing students enrolled in the Providence Hospital School of Nursing.

compared with 1,150 in the fall. There is normally a drop between fall and winter terms. "The energy crisis may have helped dampen occupancy, but we feel that our new residence hall programs have helped too."

A student ride pool first begun three years ago has been expanded to serve faculty and staff. There are currently 23 university pools.

The FYES figures are determined by dividing the total undergraduate credits for each academic session by 31, master's credits by 24, and doctoral credits by 16.

Comprising OU's predicted 7,500 FYES figure for 1973 - 74 are: 613 students for summer 1973; 3,434 students for fall 1973; 3,138 students for winter 1974; and a predicted 725 students for spring 1974.

Each of the scouting graduates distinguished himself in the Cub Scouts by earning that organization's highest award, the Arrow of Light.

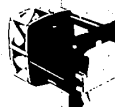
