Teen creates tourney for Ping Pong people

Anyone for Ping Pong? You don't have to be a pro to enter the teen Ping Pong tournaments starting Saturday in the Southfield Parks and Recreation Building. Guys and girls, 13-18, are welcome, and everybody wins.

The tournaments, which will be held from noon to 6 p.m. the third

Saturday of each month, are the brain child of 16-year-old Bob Wallace Jr., a Southfield High School student.

Wallace spends a lot of time helping out at "our place," the affectionate term for the lower level center at Parks and Rec. When he suggested organizing a Ping Pong tournament, the response was enthusiastic.

"THERE'LL be trophies for first, second and third place winners," said the young volunteer. "Plaques with the names of the winners also will be posted on the walls of 'our place.'"

Wallace doesn't want to leave anyone out. He's planning on giving prizes to the best losers, consolation prizes for the also-rans and passes for "our place" weekend dances to the fourth and fifth place winners.

Besides coordinating monthly matches, Wallace will be one of three referees. He's planning a special bonus for first and second place winners.

"THE WINNERS will get to play Doug Gaylor, superintendent of Parks and Rec. They'll really be bucking some stiff competition." The matches will start with sin-

gles, but if things go well, Wallace is planning on doubles tournaments and maybe even teams of four or five. So far, 21 teens have registered.

Entry fee is \$1, and players can register at "our place" the Friday before each tournament. "Our place" is open from 3:30 to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. weekends.

"After the games get rolling," Wallace said, "we're going to plan some fun things like using your feet instead of your hands. We don't want these matches to be all pressure and competition."

WALLACE, who lives in the Ten Mile-Beech area, said he didn't have many friends in the neighborhood when he was in junior high. That's how he got interested in "our place," and it's become a way of life.

"Bob was so enthused about the idea of the tournaments, I told him to go ahead," said Jude McLaughlin, teen director at Parks and Rec. "He took the initiative and organized the whole thing himself. We're really proud of him."

Wallace said he couldn't have done it without a lot of help from his friend, Jude.
