"The company decided that this would be a fair way to evaluate the clerks. And it would give nonprofit organizations a way to earn mon-ev," she said.

THE EVALUATIONS are made as a result of normal huying trips by each trained member of the organization. The only re-quirements are a one-hour train-must send in at least 10 evalua-tions per month. Each month Ms. Keyes mails to the organization one dollar for each evaluation they turned in.
