Hills council backs 2 planning decisions

A proposed rezoning and a request for public hearing were both shot down by the Farmington Hills City Council Monday night.

The council rejected 6-0 (Councilman Margaret Schaffer was absent) a request from the Lifetime Door Co. to rezone a parcel from residential to office zoning.

The parcel is located on the northwest corner of Valley Drive and Northwestern Highway.

The second request was for a rehearing before the planning commission.

William S. Munger asked to rezone a 20 acre site from residential to a zone that would allow an apartment complex. It was denied 6-0.

MUNGER HAD asked that the site be rezoned to permit the building of a \$13 million, 225-unit apartment complex at the southeast corner of Farmington and 18 Mile roads.

The parcel is surrounded by residential property, and according to the future land use plan developed for Farmington Hills, the property was to remain residential.

In line with this, the planning commission voted 8-0 to deny the request.

Councilman Earl Oppenheimer

said he felt single-family homes could be built on the parcel.

He added that to send the request back to the planning commission would only postpone its fate.

He moved that the council deny the request. His motion passed unanimously.

THE REQUEST from the Lifetime Door Co. was for a zoning that would permit construction of an office building up to two-stories in height.

Under the zoning ordinances, a barbershop, beauty salon, church or parking lot would also have been permitted.


