Auditions open soon

Applications are being accepted now from young actors seeking entrance to Oakland University's Academy of Dramatic Art to train for careers in the professional theatre.

Annual competitive auditions will be held April 27 and 28 in the academy's Studio Theatre, Varner Hall, and in the weeks to follow in New York, San Francisco and Chicago. Students accepted in spring auditions will start their classes in September at the university located 25 miles north of Detroit.

The sole requirement for acceptance into the Academy is a natural talent for acting. And, while the minimum educational requirement for entry is a high school diploma or its equivalent, the more mature student derives the most benefit from the two-year training course.

BASIC SUBJECTS offered are voice and speech, stage movement,

mime and dance, and acting. Collateral subjects include such courses as fencing, singing for the actor and TV-film technique.

Culmination of the training is membership in the Studio Company in which senior students round out their pre-professional capabilities by performing in masterpieces plays in their own theatre. Members of the regular teaching staff at the academy are gifted professional American, Canadian and English theater artists. Throughout the year guest artist/directors from New York, Hollywood and from Meadow Brook Theatre (the distinguished resident professional company at the University) conduct seminars or direct plays at the Academy.

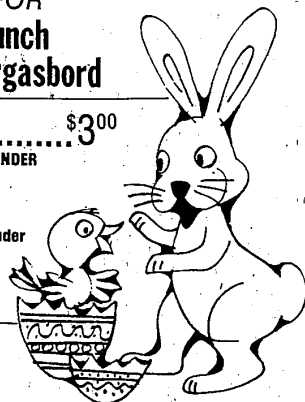

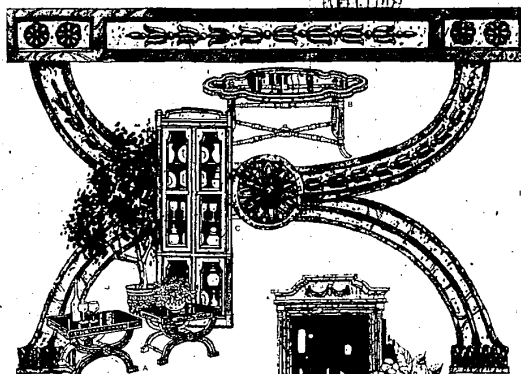
