

William Ortman runs for house

FARMINGTON—Farmington Hills Council William Ortman announced he is seeking the Republican nomination for the 64th district seat in the State House of Representatives currently held by Raymond Baker.

Baker recently announced his retirement. The district includes Farmington, Farmington Hills and western portion of Southfield.

Ortman, a member of the law firm of Ortman and Ortman, was a nominee for justice of the Michigan Supreme Court in 1972 under the Conservative Party label.

He served two terms with the former Village of Wood Creek Farms council.

ORTMAN HOLDS a Juris Doctorate from the University of Detroit, and attended the University of Michigan Graduate Business School.

He said he has held executive positions in both industry and government, as well as teaching civics and government before becoming a lawyer.

"I have been accomplishment oriented during my years of public service," he said.

"It's time to limit taxes, abolish deficit spending and prohibit government from levying new taxes or increasing the rate or base of existing taxes without voter approval."

Dust control program starts

FARMINGTON HILLS—Residents will get dusty streets chlorided this summer for the first time, paid by the city.

The council Monday approved a \$40,000 program to control dust on secondary roads and subdivision streets this summer.

The application will begin in several weeks, and continue until all streets have received four applications, according to a city hall spokesman.

The council also approved the purchase of three pieces of heavy equipment to use in road maintenance.

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Hills to join in county plan

FARMINGTON HILLS—The Farmington Hills City Council voted unanimously Monday to join with Oakland County in submitting a solid waste disposal plan to the state.

The resolution fulfills the obligation of the city to submit a plan for solid waste disposal for the area. Farmington recently voted to take the same route recently.

The Oakland County plan was drawn up as an alternative to one presented by SEMCOG, Mayor Robert McConnell said.

It calls for a series of landfill sites located mainly in the western

part of the county, and a transfer station to be located in Farmington.

In other business, the council:

- Enacted a modification of the penal code ordinance.
- Enacted a change in the wei.
- Enacted a local weighmaster ordinance.
- Enacted a local swimming pool ordinance.

- Introduced a change in the unsafe building ordinance which will charge the cost of administration for demolishing buildings to the owner.
