Springtime marks the annual transition from indoor to outdoor tennis. The majority of tennis players find themselves in for a rude awakening the first week or two of outside play. Suddenly there is the wind, the sun and the rain to contend with. Afterpalying indoors under ideal conditions all winter these added problems make the game more difficult. There are a number of things you should keep in mind when starting to play outdoors. The most important of these is complete concentration and keeping your eye on the ball. Everything is more wide open and most courts don't have the ideal background that indoor courts have. WHEN YOU have a cross wind you have to allow for the windage factor in your shot. Remember this when hitting balls down the line aiming slightly outside with the wind blowing in and inside with the wind blowing out.

Area cyclists in Ohio tour
