If you've gotten the feeling recently, that the family finances were running you — instead of the other way around — you're probably in very good company. Economic circumstances, often beyond individual control, have greatly increased the number of families in financial difficulty this spring.

But runaway family finances, including a suddenly too heavy debt load, can be brought under control. The American Bankers Association (ABA) recommends three steps in the process:

With less money to spend, and more of it going for such essentials as food and shelter, fewer dollars are available for other budget intems, including repayment of previously extended loans. Under these conditions, loan delinquencies (instalments over 80 days late) normally begin to rise, and recent ABA statisties show that they have risen sharply during the pass ix months.

Another very real factor in financial difficulties can be (and in some parts of the country has been during this period) unemploy-

Consumers can be, and often are, helped over rough spots through deferred payment arrangement and/or extension of credit terms to bring down monthly payments.

The ABA points out that creditors much prefer to work out an arrangement equitable to all than to repossess a car or foreclose on a house. A trank explanation of the situation will often be enough to reassure the lender, that you intend to uphold the loan contract and could result in a grace period as well as some sound financial counseling.


