ment the revenue of the University by approximately \$3,800,000 fill-ing the gap between the \$67.8 mil-lion state appropriation and the funds necessary to maintain pro-grams during 1974-75, Gullen said.

He said the university is experiencing a financial bind because of a significant shift in the composition of the student body. The less costly freshmen and sophomore programs have experienced a decline in enrollments while upper division levels have grown.

division levels have grown.

The president noted that junior and senior programs are 65 percent more expensive than fresimen and sophomore programs; masters programs more than three times as costly as lower division programs; professional programs, on the average, four times as expensive as the lower divisions and doctoral studies, more than eight times as costly.


GULEN ALSO CITED the Carnegie Commission on Higher Education nation-wide report stating that tuition at public institutions should rise to about 33 percent of the cost of that education, and the Federal Committee for Economic Development recommendation that tuition should increase to approximately 50 percent of instructional costs. WSU tuition costs, he noted, are currently approximately 25 percent of instruction costs, with the tuition hike raising it to 27 percent.

"Even with the tultion increase it will be necessary for the administration of the University to reduce costs by more than \$2 million during 1974-75. This is the fifth straight year that such enforce savings of more than \$1 million per year is necessary," Gulen said. To assure that the tuition hike will not deprive any qualified student from attending the university because of financial need, the university is again increasing the allotment for student financial aid.


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
