

# Oakland's Mengert shows rich background

Al Mengert makes no pretenses

about it. He confides flatly how he relishes working with people and finds it easy communicating with them.

"The ability to pass on your knowledge—that's where the key lies in teaching," says Mengert, new head golf professional at Oakland Hills Country Club (OHCC) in Birmingham.

Mengert, 44, is a Spokane,

native and graduate of Stanford University in Stanford, Calif. He lives with his wife, Diana, and four children in Bloomfield Hills.

His quick acceptance since arriving at OHCC last March stems partly from a warm personality and partly from impressive credentials.

MENGERT BROKE into the

professional golf ranks during the early 1950s, playing alongside golf greats like Arnold Palmer and Gene Littler.

He studied the sport's rudiments under such legends on the links as Ben Hogan, Sam Snead and Byron Nelson.

Mengert's roots in the world of putting and chips run deep. They stem back nearly 35 years.

Mengert first took an interest in golf after watching his father play at the Spokane country club to which the Mengerts belonged.

WITHIN A FEW years, Mengert proved a power to be reckoned with on the competitive amateur golf circuit.

In 1946 and 1947, he captured the national junior title. In 1951, he won the Northwest Armed Forces crown.

The next year, he emerged as runner-up during the U.S. Amateur; the same year, he paced the Mexican National Amateur.

Mengert turned professional in 1952. Since then, he has achieved a trophy-case full of golf accolades both as a player and as a teacher.

AS A PLAYER, he has qualified for 28 major tournaments on the professional golfers' tour, including nine masters and eight U.S. open tournaments.

Mengert also competed during the premier Michigan Professional Golfers' Association (PGA) Tournament conducted two weeks ago at Red Run Golf Club in Royal Oak.

He finished in a three-way tie for third place, five strokes off the pace, during the kickoff version of annual festivities sponsored by metropolitan Detroit's Chevy dealers.

What's more, Mengert already has carded a shimmering 67 on OHCC's "monster" South Course, which matches the course record set by Ben Hogan during the 1951 U.S. Open.

AS A TEACHER, Mengert has held the post of head golf profes-

sional at private clubs in Westfield, N.J., St. Louis, Mo., Sacramento, Calif., Tacoma, Wash., and, most recently, Cleveland.

Mengert has launched his teaching career as assistant professional at fabled Winged Foot Golf Club in Mamaroneck, N.Y.

Mengert's background also shows stints as a director and as a consultant to numerous golf-advisory groups.

To help augment organized programs for golfers at every age proficiency level, Mengert meets regularly with OHCC's golf events chairmen.

PRESENTLY, OHCC conducts annual tournaments for veteran, men, women and junior players.

For women, Mengert also has introduced the Al Mengert Invitational. This year's premiere invitational champion was Tinka Falconer.

Golf's lure? It's a perpetual challenge, according to Mengert. As he perceptively put it:

"The sport keeps you thinking. It's a constant battle to better your game. You never really reach the point where you can say, 'I've got

it.'"

## Junior golfers learn in summer program

"Chicken Winger," "Mr. Piccolo Player," "Miss Hula Hips" . . . pilot names for new autumn cartoon shows on television?

Hardly. Rather, they're imaginary characters created by Al Mengert, new head golf professional at Oakland Hills Country Club (OHCC) in Birmingham.

Mengert uses them repeatedly to graphically illustrate the theme of OHCC's fledgling junior golf program — "Good results come from good form."

"Concentrating on my form," says Mengert, a 30-year veteran in competitive golf circles, "has kept my swing together."

OHCC's JUNIOR golf program, first-voiced around United States Golf Association standards, still is in its infant stages.

That's why Tuesdays and Thursdays, the days when practically

150 junior players hit the imposing links for lessons, are quite special at OHCC.

The six-week summer program has broken into four age brackets — 10-12 mixed, 13-18 girls; 13-18 boys and 16-18 boys.

On Thursdays, participants get personalized instruction on golf's rudiments through demonstrations and rap sessions from Mengert and his assistant, Bruce Keil.

ON TUESDAYS, participants, grouped by proficiency level, gather course experience under the supervision of volunteer parents.

The program's guiding lights are Annie Wright and Joan Ziegler. Mrs. Wright teaches six girls; Mrs. Walrus Lake, eight boys. In Birmingham, Mrs. Ziegler belongs to the Bloomfield Hills School Board.

They conceptualized the program last year. The program's implementation paralleled Mengert's arrival at OHCC last March.

Mrs. Wright says she pegs the program as a real boon for OHCC's younger linksters.

"PRIOR TO THIS program, there was nothing really going on for them," she said.

"Joan and I, after meeting on the tee one day, both decided they needed something more concrete, something more structured."

"So we went ahead and wrote the program."

The program's success is reflected in OHCC's sudden emergence as a tough contender in local inter-club junior golf play. OHCC's junior golf team is coordinated by Nancy Coughenour.

OHCC's representatives during Junior District Golf Association of Detroit action also are picked from among program participants.

The program will culminate with OHCC's Junior Golf Championship Aug. 10-11.

Mrs. Wright says OHCC's older players back the program wholeheartedly.

"They're not so fearful anymore about the prospect of all these kids descending aimlessly onto two big grin."
