End sought to park's status

OAKLAND COUNTY — Oakland county commissioners,
through two resolutions, are being
asked to seek legislation which will
end the county taxpayers "subsidizing the City of Dearborn."
Commissioners Patrick M. Nowak (R-25) and James Dunleavy
(R-2) charged during Thursday's
(July 18) board meeting that state
approval of the existence of Camp
Dearborn — 262 acres of improved
park land in southwestern Milford
Township — as a tax-free public
park should be halted by state
legislation.

park should be halted by state legislation. Camp Dearborn, founded in 1947, was operated as a private park until about four years ago. Then, by agreement with the state tax commission, the property was considered a public facility and removed from the Oakland County property tax rolls. The camp, open primarily in summer months, is free to Dearborn residents; all others pay a \$5 per car parking fee.

Legislation that would equalize property assessments by class is urged in the commissioners' reso-lution.
