

U-M seeks women who wish to return

Women who are thinking about starting college or continuing an education after interruptions will find a series of courses being offered at the University of Michigan.

For women with jobs who would like to return to school a conversation will be held at noon Tuesday at the Michigan League in Ann Arbor sponsored by the Center for Continuing Education of Women.

This will include a lunch and a talk with the center's staff on admission procedures and how to arrange job and class schedules.

Starting the first week in September the center will offer 10 introductory and upper-level electives especially for women with busy schedules.

The center may be contacted for a list of these and many other offerings in the 1974 fall term courses.

On Monday, Sept. 30 from 7:30-9:30 p.m., the center has arranged an evening with a university librarian on library resources and procedures. Advance registration is necessary.

Tours of the graduate and undergraduate libraries are being offered daily Sept. 9-20. The tour schedule will be posted at the center.

The center is open weekdays, 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m. All interested women and men are invited to drop in to get acquainted. The center is a comprehensive service for women planning education and careers in the framework of other responsibilities.

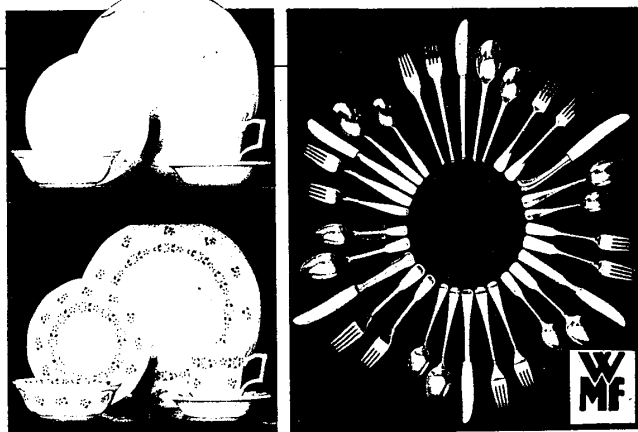

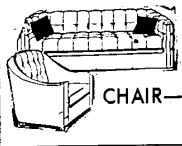
