
Players who like defensive prob-loms should cover the South and West hand. They should next re-view the bidding. The dummy may be a bit of a surprise, but North probably had considerable pride. It is reasonable to expect a partner who opens the bidding to produce one trick.

East won the opening lead and returned the heart three. South played the ten and West won with the queen. The heart eight was continued and South played the seven as East won the ace.

AS EAST you are now forced

AS EAST you are now forced with a decision about what to lead. It is obvious that to defa the contract, the defense must win too quick tricks.

Superficially, it appears East should lead a spade since South bid diamonds. So casual an approach will not lead to a good sorce. Instead, East must try to reconstruct South's hand.

If the spade lead is right, declarer must hold the spade king and the ace, king and jack of diamonds - to go with the jack of hearts. This brings the point count to 12 and East might consider South's style and willingness to open that hand.


